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Introduction

Traditional whiskies have formed consumers' expectations and understanding of what is meant by the term "whisky". It is these whiskies which have been traded internationally. Today, as a result, consumers in different markets expect whisky to be made from cereals, distilled in a certain way, aged for a minimum period in wooden casks, and sold at a strength not less than 40% alc. vol. This ensures whisky retains the colour, aroma and taste derived from its raw materials and production process.

This standard sets out the requirements which are consistent with that reputation. In particular, it provides a definition of the production process for whisky, the methods of analysis and the main categories of whisky traded globally.

1 Scope

This British Standard specifies the analytical parameters and methods of analysis used for whisky production.

The parameters and methods provided in this British Standard establish authenticity and consistency with the production process for whisky, the expected organoleptic characteristics, the typical ranges for analytes of interest and other technical matters.

This British Standard is applicable to UK distillers as well as new entrants to the industry and regulators.

This British Standard does not include operational methods/issues.

cereal-based matured spirit drink defined by its production process

NOTE 2 This British Standard covers whisky irrespective of the spelling (both whisky or whiskey can be considered).
